Dear Senator Alexander and Representative Kline:

With Members of Congress preparing to consider the *Every Student Succeeds Act* (S. 1177), the Council for American Private Education (CAPE) expresses our strongest possible support for the elements within the bill that improve equitable services to students and teachers in religious and independent schools. We urge you and your colleagues in the House and Senate to ensure that these provisions are quickly enacted into law.

Section 1117 of the act, which amends Section 1120 (20 U.S.C. 6320) of the *Elementary and Secondary Education Act*, as well as Section 8015, which offers a host of general provisions, including amendments to Section 9501 (20 U.S.C. 7881) of ESEA, together contain important changes that would provide equity, clarity, timeliness, assurances, and overall improvements to the provision of services to private school children and their teachers.

When ESEA was first enacted, Congress determined that federal education aid should be directed in an equitable way toward helping all children in need, regardless of the type of school they attend. That principle of equitably shared funding and services governed the implementation of ESEA from 1965 until its most recent iteration, the *No Child Left Behind Act*, when certain funding formulas and set-asides began to erode equity. Provisions in S. 1171 would help correct those inequities and would strengthen the safeguards designed to ensure equity. These are important developments that have been a long time coming.

By way of background, the Council for American Private Education (CAPE) is a coalition of 19 national organizations (listed left) and 36 state affiliates serving private elementary and secondary schools. There are 31,000 private schools in the United States; one in four of the nation's schools is a private school. About 5.3 million students (10 percent of all PK-12 students) attend them. CAPE member organizations represent about 80 percent of private school enrollment nationwide.

Thank you for the leadership you have shown in bringing this legislation to fruition and in helping to ensure equitable services to students and teachers in religious and independent schools.
